Sehr geehrte Frau Oberbürgermeisterin,

ich stelle folgenden Dringlichkeitsantrag:

Der Beschluss des Umweltausschusses vom 12.10.2020 gemäß Beschlussvorlage BSV/20/04863 "Finanzielle Unterstützung der Stadt Augsburg bei den Umbaumaßnahmen der Schimpansenanlage der Zoologischer Garten Augsburg GmbH" in Höhe von 500.000 Euro wird vorläufig ausgesetzt. Die Verwaltung wird beauftragt, in Abstimmung mit der Zoo GmbH zu prüfen, inwieweit eine Überführung der im Augsburger Zoo lebenden Schimpansen in die Anlage "Wales Apes & Monkeys Sanctuary" unter der Voraussetzung des Tierwohls möglich ist und dadurch ein Umbau der Schimpansenanlage und der damit verbundenen Kosten entfallen würde.

Der Umweltausschuss hat in seiner Sitzung vom 12.10.2020 beschlossen, dem Zoologischen Garten Augsburg eine finanzielle Unterstützung der Stadt Augsburg zum Umbau der Schimpansenanlage in Höhe von 500.000 Euro zum gesamten Kostenaufwand von 768.024,76 € zu gewähren. Eine weitere finanzielle Unterstützung für den Umbau in Höhe von 250 Tausend Euro wurde vom Verein Freundeskreis des Zoos zugesagt.

Der Umbau der bisherigen Schimpansenanlage ist dringend geboten, weil die momentane Tierhaltung nach Auffassung des Amtes für Verbraucherschutz und Veterinärwesen nicht den Bestimmungen des Tierrechts entspricht. Doch auch nach einem Umbau wären zwar Verbesserungen zu erzielen, die Anlage würde jedoch nach wie vor nicht tierrechtskonform sein. Der Bau einer tierrechtskonformen Anlage würde nach Angaben der Zoodirektorin Frau Jantschke in einer Größenordnung von etwa 20 Millionen Euro liegen. Ein solcher Umbau ist nicht finanzierbar.

Die Zoo GmbH war bislang bei ihren Versuchen erfolglos geblieben, die Tiere in andere Zoos abzugeben. Nach den Angaben der Zoo-Geschäftsführung könnte die Anlage mit anderen Tieren des Zoos besetzt werden, wenn doch noch eine Möglichkeit gefunden würde, die drei Schimpansen in eine andere Einrichtung zu überführen.

Eine solche Möglichkeit eröffnet sich durch das Angebot der "Wales Apes & Monkeys Sanctuary". Der Direktor der Einrichtung hat in einem Briefwechsel mit mir die Bereitschaft geäußert, die Schimpansen aufzunehmen. Er könnte der Bitte entsprechen, das weitere Zusammenleben der drei Tiere in einer sozialen Gemeinschaft zu garantieren. Außerdem hat der Direktor der Einrichtung amtliche Zertifizierungen beigefügt.

Deshalb beantrage ich die Prüfung der Überführungsmöglichkeit der drei Schimpansen in die genannte Einrichtung durch die Verwaltung. Eine mögliche neue Heimat für die drei Schimpansen würde eine Unterbringung ermöglichen, die dem Tierwohl entspricht. Die Stadt, die Freunde des Zoos und die Zoo GmbH würden sich erhebliche Kosten für einen nicht tierrechtskonformen Umbau sparen und damit Mittel für andere dringende Investitionen freisetzen.

I am writing to confirm that Wales Ape & Monkey Sanctuary has been approved under the above Regulations, in accordance with the requirements of Annex C of the Balai Directive. The approval number is AB/56/05/001.

Standard Requirements for the Design, Construction, Operation and Management of Authorised Quarantine Premises at Zoo's Acclimatisation and Wildlife and other Establishments

Authorisation

Responsibility of proprietor of quarantine premises

The proprietor of the quarantine premises or the appointed deputy is responsible to the Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA)/Scottish Government/Welsh Government through the veterinary supervisor for ensuring the safe custody and isolation of the animals in quarantine premises throughout the period of detention, and that there is no breach of the Conditions under which this Authorisation is given.

Veterinary supervision of premises

The premises must be under the overall supervision of a veterinary surgeon engaged by the proprietors. This Supervisor's responsibilities are set out in the document of Authorisation, a copy of which is attached. Any proposed change of veterinary supervisor must be notified to APHA and approved by the Veterinary Head of Field Delivery (VHoFD)/Veterinary Lead Scotland (VLS)/Veterinary Lead Wales (VLW).

Day to day supervision of premises

On occasions when the veterinary supervisor is not in attendance at the quarantine premises, animals in quarantine must be under the observation of a responsible person familiar with the normal behaviour of the species concerned.

Reports to be made to the veterinary supervisor

Details of the following, concerning animals in the Authorised Premises, must be reported immediately to the veterinary supervisor:

- suspected rabies
- deaths the carcase must be isolated and retained until instructions as to its disposal are given by the
 veterinary supervisor. Until then neither the carcase nor any part of it may be used for any purpose. All
 carcases and materials should be incinerated on the premises unless alternative methods of disposal
 have been authorised by APHA
- biting and scratching incidents involving humans.
- escapes from the isolation and detention accommodation or from the premises.

The veterinary supervisor must also be provided with details of births, illness in animals, numbers of animals moved on and off the premises, for inclusion in their monthly report to the VHoFD/VLS/VLW.

Quarantine premises

- the authorised premises must be maintained in a good state of repair.
- no changes must be made to the structure of the premises or in the arrangements for the isolation and detention of animals unless such a change is authorised by APHA
- no persons other than the proprietor of the premises and the staff engaged in looking after the animals, the veterinary supervisor, or authorised officers of APHA must be allowed access to animals undergoing quarantine.
- where primates are quarantined suitable protective clothing must be available at all times for the use of authorised officers of APHA carrying out inspections of the premises. This clothing should consist of complete bodily covering including head and legs, such as an overall suit, mask, eye goggles or face visor, rubber boots and gloves.

Statutory quarantine period

All animals (except vampire bats and pet animals subject to EC Regulation 576/2013) subject to restrictions under the Rabies (Importation of Dogs, Cats and Other Mammals) Order 1974 must be detained and isolated for four calendar months from the date of their landing in Great Britain. Vampire bats and their progeny must be detained and isolated for life in Great Britain.

The Secretary of State may extend the quarantine period if:

an outbreak of rabies is suspected or confirmed in the quarantine premises; or b. an animal with which it
has been sharing becomes ill or dies near the end of the detention period.

Each consignment of animals must be separately detained and isolated throughout the quarantine period. For this purpose separate consignments arriving at the same premises within a period of 48 hours may be treated as a single batch. If for socialisation purposes, the owner wishes to introduce quarantine animals to animals already in the collection, a licence is required in advance from APHA.

Removal of animals from their cages during quarantine

Animals in quarantine must not be removed from their cages unless the express permission of the veterinary supervisor has first been obtained, and the movement is for essential experimental, surgical, medical, or welfare reasons and takes place within the quarantine area.

Production of licences, etc.

The licence, notice or other form of authorisation under which an animal is detained must be produced, on demand, for inspection by an officer of the Police, of the local authority, or a Veterinary Officer of APHA Quarantine premises must be open at all reasonable times for inspection by persons authorised by the appropriate Department.

An inspector of the local authority or a constable may inspect the records required under the Order. The only persons allowed access to animals undergoing guarantine are:

- · the veterinary superintendent or his/her authorised deputy or deputies
- · the owner of the premises and members of his/her staff
- · a veterinary officer of the appropriate Department
- · a person authorised by and assisting (a) (b) or (c) in their duties,; and
- any person employed by the emergency services, requiring access to the premises in the event of an emergency.

Staff employed at quarantine premises

Staff must be instructed to the satisfaction of the Veterinary Superintendent. This instruction must involve training in the dangers of rabies, the precaution designed to prevent cross infection, escape and unauthorised entry and the obligation to report any escape incident to the proprietor immediately. Staff must be advised about the Department of Health pre-exposure rabies vaccination which is available free of charge.

Constructional Requirements

- all quarantine premises must be of strong permanent construction and designed so as to prevent the
 escape of quarantine animals from the premises and access by other animals and unauthorised persons. In
 particular, all windows must be escape proof. They should be covered with wire mesh or an equivalent
 material relevant to meet the security requirements of the particular animal(s). In the case of fixed (i.e. nonopening) windows armoured glass may be an acceptable alternative to wire mesh
- all animal holding rooms must be numbered so that by reference to the plan of the premises submitted with the report form (RM13), the precise location of each is known
- all entrances to a block or section of units must have an outer door and an inner door forming a trap to
 prevent an animal escaping. The distance between these doors must be such that anything normally used in
 that block may be taken through the trap in such a way that there is always one door shut. The inner door, if
 solid, must have an escape proof viewing panel in it. Both doors must open inwards and be self-closing or
 have an equivalent level of security.
- · depending on the species concerned, animal units must be so designed and constructed so as to:
 - premises other than acclimatisation centres must receive a reasonable amount of daylight. Artificial lighting must be sufficient to allow the proper cleansing of units and the safe handling of animals at all times
 - o allow an adequate and constant supply of fresh air
 - o heating, and
 - for fresh drinking water to be available
- · provision must be made for:
 - access at all reasonable times by authorised APHA personnel to inspect records and premises
 - o clinical examination of animals on arrival
 - o post-mortem examinations
 - routine surgical and medical treatment and vaccination for conditions other than rabies
 - o anaesthesia
 - o isolation of sick animals
 - incineration or other suitable arrangements for destruction of carcases, specimens and residues, faeces, bedding, uneaten food and any other waste
 - o maintenance of satisfactory hygiene arrangements (including handling)
 - o adequate cleansing and disinfection of equipment and premises
 - adequate fire precautions
 - washing facilities for staff
 - suitable protective clothing to be available for APHA inspectors where primates are quarantined.

Subject to the following precautions, animals in circuses, zoos, wildlife or safari parks may be exhibited whilst undergoing quarantine. Animals on exhibition must be so separated from other animals and from the public that there is no possibility of the spread of rabies by direct or indirect means. This can be achieved for example by the provision of a transparent solid barrier or a minimum distance (dependent on the species concerned but never less than 2 metres) between the animal in quarantine and the public/non-quarantine animals.

Circuses

Premises may only be authorised for quarantine in a circus provided they are on a fixed site (e.g. winter quarters) and the quarantine accommodation is in a permanent building or a structure offering equal security. The quarantine animals must be isolated and detained in this accommodation which must be completely separate from the accommodation for non-quarantine animals. Quarantine in travelling circuses is not permitted. Performances of quarantine animals in circuses will be allowed only if the authorised quarantine premises include the ring and access tunnels.

Movement and records of animals and animal tissues

An imported animal subject to quarantine controls must be carried to and from the authorised quarantine premises only by an APHA Authorised Carrying Agent. The movement of animals on to or off the authorised premises must not take place without the APHA prior written authority.

Records must be kept of the date species and number of animals:

- · moved onto the premises from and their origin
- moved off the premised and their destination
- born on the premises
- died on the premises
- removed from their cages for medical, surgical, welfare experimentation or any other essential reason
- · arriving on the premises within 48 hours of each other and treated for quarantine as a single batch
- added to animals undergoing quarantine. Permission for co-terminus quarantine must be applied for, in writing to the VHoFD/VLS/VLW, giving the import licence number and date of import into the UK.

Removal of animal tissue or other material from quarantine premises

No tissue or material from animals, alive or dead, in quarantine must be removed from the premises unless under the written authority of the veterinary supervisor.

Hygiene

Where non-quarantine animals are kept on the same site as quarantine animals, operations must be so organised as to minimise the number of persons having duties to perform in both sections. The frequency of their movement between the quarantine and non-quarantine premises must be minimised. Outer clothing and footwear, worn by quarantine staff and the veterinary superintendent/deputy must be kept clean and must be changed or disinfected before they leave the quarantine premises. Post mortem examinations, when necessary, must normally be conducted by the veterinary superintendent or deputy and only essential staff may be present. They must wear protective clothing, i.e. boots, waterproof outer clothing, gloves, mask, goggles and head covering. This clothing must be cleaned and disinfected unless of a disposable nature, in which case it must be destroyed by incineration immediately after use.

The whole of the quarantine premises must be kept in a clean, tidy and hygienic condition and measures must be taken to control vermin. In order to discourage rodents, when practical, uneaten food must not normally be left in an animal's unit after feeding time. Fixed automatic water bowls must be kept in a hygienic condition. Food preparation rooms and kitchens must be kept in a clean and hygienic condition at all times. Food and drinking bowls and any other utensils used by an animal in quarantine must be kept in good condition, and be made of a material that can be adequately cleansed and disinfected. They must not be transferred between animals without first having been cleansed and disinfected. Brushes, shovels and other tools must be kept in a hygienic condition and used solely in the quarantine premises. Any meat or meat product which is in the crate of an imported animal when it arrives in quarantine must be destroyed by incineration to avoid the risk of introducing exotic animal diseases. Crates in which an animal has been delivered must be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected before removal from the premises.

The following are the main forms relating to the duties of the Veterinary Superintendent:

- RM21 Monthly report by supervisor of quarantine premises (research establishment)
- RM30 Report by the supervisor of the arrival of imported animals
